#### Architectural education in Europe State of affairs and perspectives

Report on the Arc et Senans Workshop,  
12-14 November 1992

#### PLACE

The Royal Saltworks at Arc et Senans is an expression of the architectural theory of a key period straddling two centuries and is one of the most achieved monuments we have inherited from the Age of Enlightenment. The structure of what was a state monopoly, fortress and symbol of royal power is still intact, bearing the strong imprint of Ledoux's ideas. It is a receptacle of utopian and manifestly oppressive aesthetic forces.

Ledoux's career was interrupted by the Revolution and he subsequently devoted his time to architectural theory, the fruit

of which was "L'Architecture considérée sous le rapport de l'art, des moeurs et de la législation" (Architecture considered from the point of view of art, morals and law) in 1804.

#### TIME

The scope of this work of Ledoux is not dissimilar to the issues that brought together from 16 different countries the 60 participants of our seminar at the salt-works, "Architectural Education in Europe: State of Affairs and Perspectives"- what an ambitious subject! Two centuries on, Arc et Senans has been turned to new purposes but what has not changed is the cunning use of volumes, the very hierarchical visuals and the interplay of materials, light, shadow and perspective against an undefined backcloth, all of which create an atmosphere that changes by the hour and the day.

But the forces I referred to earlier are expressed or perceived differently nowadays and Arc et Senans has been a peaceful, welcoming and far from oppressive

venue for our discussions. Indeed, the enclosed space and sense of density have surely helped focus our ideas.

#### SUBJECT

Just as a laborious process of evaporation was needed to make salt, a long laborious process is needed to crystallize the ideas emerging from our heated, intensive and sometimes conflicting exchanges of views. This hastily drawn-up report should thus been seen more as a sketchy outline of points of view that have still to crystallize, than as a proper record of the meeting.

#### 1. THE MOST PRESSING QUESTIONS

(reproduced here as presented to the meeting)

- Oxford: Re-designing the curriculum and raising the level of architectural debate
- Many responses are possible.
- Madrid: Drawing up a new curriculum (we have no choice) and reconsidering the career of teachers.





- Manchester: Redefining the objectives and audience, so that the appropriate content, methods and curricula are developed in response to a fast-changing world.
- Brussels: Organization of specializations at the end of the course.
- Thessaloniki: The differentiating and distinctive character and role of architectural education considered as a social mechanism.
- Barcelona: Look at all areas - Stress of professional aspects.
- Oslo: Questions concerning qualifications and roles - New Educational structure for the whole higher education system in Norway.
- Eindhoven: Four-year programme compared with five years in rest of Europe.
- London: Reduction in course length. Reduction in personal 1:1 tutorials (Enlarging tutorials, cutting down on time devoted to students)
- Aarhus: Development of architectural research - keeping our collegiate administrative system.
- Greenwich: Pressure from construction industry to change the nature of architectural education - Department of Education wants to cut length of course to four years only! - NVQ defining scope of professional competence; more students/less money! - Keeping studio-based courses.
- Las Palmas: The way the profession/university relates to the problems society/city life.
- Prague: New situation post-1989 (breaking down of the Wall and the Iron Curtain); changing the professional status of teachers; slackening of studies, which is a problem for the students themselves.
- Brussels: Status of architecture education (part of university or independence on same lines as university)
- Lisboa: Courses fees (all universities); requirements resulting from EEC recommendations; the role of the architect
- Torino: Attempts to "disappear" the problem of student numbers by bringing in short diploma courses. There are as many architecture students in Italy as in the rest of Europe put together.
- Montpellier: Status of architecture studies; state of play in the various countries re EC Directives; problem of resources made available to schools; setting-up the Architecture 2000 programme.
- Lyon: Ambiguity concerning the purpose of studies with no professional training and a diploma giving accreditation; no

postgraduate studies, hence poor level of research:

- Karlsruhe: Increasing numbers of students while facilities and staff numbers lag behind.
- Mons: Relationship between architecture studies and society; development of an adequate cultural/social framework to set up a good architecture course at the university (land-use planning faculty).
- Milano: Students numbers (18000) make it impossible to give adequate project-based training; need for postgraduate research.
- Montpellier: Disparity of financing for teaching and research between the different countries.
- Oulu: The budget!-budget will be allocated on the basis of the number of degrees awarded, so there will be tendency to boost number of degrees awarded.
- Thessaloniki: Far-reaching reforms of schools (administrative and academic) taking place since 1982, makes for problems in assessing students and teachers and is a source of conflict..
- Paris: Teaching architecture and/or training architects; more money needed but also more thought about these studies.
- Versailles: Difficult period-growth of these studies and need to change status of schools; going beyond traditional practices-difficult balance between urban planning and architecture.
- Geneva: The worst imaginable crisis-closure of the school.

The issues raised often overlapped but also had to be seen in regional or international contexts. The situation everywhere was in a state of flux, and the solutions to problems often contradictory. Attempts at rationalization are operated in a piecemeal fashion.

## 2. PAPERS, DISCUSSIONS AND GUIDE-LINES FOR ACTION

Could these issues be placed, with reference to common situations, into some kind of theoretical framework?

If we were to distance ourselves from the image and myth of the profession of architect and the efforts to extend knowledge about architecture, common attitudes emerge in the form of work projects and new initiatives.

John Habraken, Tom Markus and Philippe Boudon called on us to stop dwel-

ling on situations of crisis or our impotence. If architecture does not form in itself a field of knowledge, it is possible to try to move towards a stated tuition elaboration knowledge on architecture.

If architectural knowledge is not one of the disciplines present in the field of architecture but a specific field of knowledge, is this field in the professional or educational domain? How is it transmitted from one to the other? Without our own architectural vocabulary, we have difficulty in expressing the basis for this specific knowledge. (The vocabulary belongs to others, to the critics of architecture).

According to Habraken, this lack of vocabulary, of relevant knowledge and methodology comes from the image of a profession steeped in the myth of the avantgarde. "Avantgarde" architecture was autonomous, did not accept change, was true to itself only and is independant on method.

The concepts of variety and complexity, and the growth, the development and the transformation of the forms taken by our constructed environment makes raise questions of method.

If we are also to add the widely shared view that there are different types of professional architect and different ways of practising architecture, one easily accepts the idea that architecture schools have a triple role to play in higher education: professional, cultural and scientific. And architectural projects are not a simulation but both the means and the end of the teaching of architecture. Thus, Bourdon remarked, it was better to focus on the educational obstacles and diversity of approaches rather than worry about the real meaning of a project.

The academic context we discussed is not merely a question of money or crisis. We have to convince decision-makers of the complexity of our discipline and therefore to protect course length. Current economic policy and the play of market forces are not conducive to the notion of quality as we understand it. It is difficult to convince decision makers that architecture courses in the present form and length are entirely appropriate or that society needs more architects.



We should, however, insist that:

- architecture covers more than a few individual buildings;
- it is more complex than it appears, hence need to develop knowledge (know how an know what);
- the concepts of projects and designs could be extended beyond the usual limits: every region, town or building calls for better design and construction.

Than the objectives, means and substance of this expanding architecture education should be set as well by professional bodies as by governmental institutions or private clients.

### 3. LOOKING AHEAD IN DURATION AND DYNAMICS

The TERMcrisis came up frequently. How could we get out of it? Or use it? During the seminar Steve Haughton commented for the benefit of the News Sheet that the word crisis was often employed by speakers who were in fact talking about problems. He redefined the terms thus: "in order to make the traditional English breakfast of bacon and eggs, the chicken had problems but the pig had a crisis".

We are indeed in an economic crisis that will not end quickly. Another marked trend in most countries is the increasing number of students in architecture schools. At the same time EEC Directives impose standards from above: eleven articles define what an architect must know and do.

In some countries architecture courses are also fixed from below in the sense that there are common curricula covering a number of compulsory basic courses with set targets and durations.

Selection and specialization criteria (which we discussed at length) are other factors that determine (or standardize) student entry and leaving profiles.

Should we be concerned about the increasing standardization of architecture studies as a result of a number of quality and economy controls?

In the countries that organize architectural education on the basis of national curriculum, one can find a certain diversity of schools and courses of study. This diversity arises from the way common

rules are interpreted, but also from schools' immediate and not-so-immediate environments, which act as a "crucible" for the various forces at work, making them understandable. We therefore have a good deal of freedom.

We should, however, beware of the latent determinism of these different constraints and retain the advantages of diversity and a certain level of quality.

A minimum length of study makes it easier to avoid the problems of defining entry and leaving profiles. A variety of prior to higher education in architecture is beneficial for students, for architectural education starts before entry into a school of architecture.

On the subject of the length of studies, there is still a wide consensus around a minimum of five years. The much-needed development of research would not be possible without a certain length of study.

There is an important point to make concerning student numbers and the size of schools: once a school exceeds a certain size, a gap forms between what the teachers (or groups of teachers) know, perceive and master in the school's curriculum and what the students know, find out and do. The students make up their own "menu", while teachers become more isolated in their educational practice.

A significant factor is at work today in Western culture. The spirit of enterprise, managerial methods and the logic of pro-

duction are held up as models. They are the determining criteria for the social value of many activities and for the granting of government aid. A section of the education authorities fascinated by business culture has brought this subculture into schools and universities.


What role will we now give to culture in the sense of a key to a part of existence that is not governed by usefulness or efficiency? Can we agree to education being governed solely by considerations of quantity and adaptation to requirements, to business becoming the reference point for the training of citizens?

I close by an appeal to our capacity for innovation, citing the mathematician Maurice Milgram:

New forms, functions and species raise questions for us. Can it be thought that an object, an attractile to be discovered resolves the new in something already there? The new is not a product (in the sense of an artefact) of what is already given: the new is recognized, understood, captured."

## SACKED - FOR DEFENDING 5-YEAR COURSES IN SCHOOLS

The battle over the length of architectural courses has claimed its first EC casualty — because he argued that Britain's five-year programme should be extended to other countries.

Professor Denys Hinton is to be replaced as president of the Architects EC Advisory Committee, which is advising on standardisation of education and training.

It is understood that Hinton's fall from office is because the DoE is unhappy that he has supported the advisory committee's decision to recommend that overall EC standards are strengthened. It wants their current four-year length upped to "at least five years' full-time training plus at least two years' professional practice".

If the recommendations were accepted this would block the UK government's well-publicised aim to cut UK architectural education from five to four years' full-time study.

It is thought Hinton was particularly concerned about EC discussions with countries planning to join the community.

Some courses as short as three years in Iceland, Switzerland and Austria may be recognised when these countries join the EC. This could set a precedent for shorter courses to be recognised among current member states.

Officially Hinton has been replaced at the request of Arcuk. Unofficially it is known that his replacement comes just weeks after he received a letter from the DoE making it clear he was expected to vote in line with the government on this issue rather than with his own committee's recommendations.

In the letter, the DoE says it considers it "undesirable" to amend the directive, and that it is also unhappy with the proposed amendments on "time-sharing" which are clearly at variance with the government's current approach on vocational qualifications.

Finally, the government could not support the amendment as it would pre-empt the outcome of the recent RIBA/Arcuk review of architectural education which it is still considering.

The letter ends by instructing Hinton to talk to the DoE's own man on the advisory committee

— Jaime Reynolds — to decide how the competent authority's vote, exercised through Hinton, should be cast.

The letter makes it clear that if Hinton was not to tow the line, the DoE would have to make its voice heard independently — a situation which it says would be far from satisfactory.

Hinton's written reply to the letter is believed to say he could not enter into any discussion with the DoE about how the advisory committee might be persuaded to behave.

Hinton went on to chair his first advisory board meeting on October 5 and 6, and received a

letter telling him that he was to be replaced less than two weeks later.

Jaime Reynolds, the DoE's man on the board, would not comment on the situation. But Alan Groves — chairman of the Arcuk finance and general purposes committee which decided Hinton's fate — admitted that the DoE had asked that a younger man be bought in at this stage. Hinton is 71 years old.

Commenting on his replacement, Hinton would only say he was unsure about some aspects of the situation and intended to bring the matter up at the next Arcuk council meeting.

## CRACKS IN ARCHITECTURE

A CONFLICT over the length of architecture degrees in Europe has led to the sacking of a British representative by the Department of the Environment.

Denys Hinton, EEC adviser on the European Architects directive, refused to vote against extending the length of architecture degrees from four to a minimum of five years.

Professor Hinton was nominated by the Architect Registration Council for the UK. He was asked by the DoE to vote against the degree extension only two days prior to the EEC Advisory Committee on Education and Training in the field of Architecture meeting in Brussels in October.

The DoE shares competent authority status with ARCUK and is therefore able to influence British representation.

Professor Hinton, the current president of this committee and a prime mover behind altering the directive's article 4, told the department he would not be influenced by their request. Following this vote in favour of the extension, a DoE official stood up and denounced his view as non-representative of the UK Government.

Professor Hinton is a former professor of architecture at Aston University and chairman of ARCUK between 1983 and 1986. He said: "This has diminished the status of ARCUK and could render the advisory committee in-

effective. I am not making any complaints or accusations. All I did was to stick to my views which are shared by the majority of architecture schools and architects. I would have had something to apologise for if I had done what the department wanted."

The DoE refuses to comment on the sacking. A spokesman said Professor Hinton's name had been put forward to the European Commission on the basis of advice from ARCUK in 1991. This was that he should be appointed subject to review after one year.

Professor Hinton says he was appointed by the Commission for three years and contends there was no mention of a one-year review. ARCUK is waiting for the

results of a DoE review which could lead to its closure. Neither the department nor the council could explain why they had waited one and a half years before deciding that Professor Hinton should be replaced, except to say that the matter had been under discussion for some time.

### 4. ADMINISTRATION ET GESTION

## II - CONTACTS INTERNATIONAUX

### A. COLLABORATION ET ECHANGES AVEC L'ACSA

A Delft, H. Louw et moi-même avons rencontré nos collègues américains et examiné avec eux les développements que pourraient avoir nos échanges et notre collaboration. Un des points discutés était la Conférence de Prague.

En tant que Président de l'AEEA, j'ai été invité à prendre la parole le jour d'ouverture de la Conférence annuelle de l'ACSA. J'y ai présenté une communication donnant mon point de vue sur cette COOPERATION ACSA-AEEA.

J'ai proposé de privilégier certains enjeux pour structurer nos échanges à venir. Ils sont repris ici dans un texte de cette communication qui est disponible au Secrétariat de l'AEEA.

J'espère que vous accepterez d'envisager les trois enjeux qui ont été définis comme base de discussion pour les futures rencontres.

Avec le nouveau Président, Jim Marker et le Secrétaire Général Richard McCommons, H. Louw et moi-même avons discuté des futures actions à développer et des modalités à envisager. La présence de Marvin Malecha à Arc et Senans est un des résultats concrets de ces premières réunions de travail.

Un autre résultat s'est concrétisé sous la forme d'une invitation au Président de l'AEEA à participer régulièrement à des réunions de travail du Conseil de l'ACSA. Premières occasions: Montréal en juillet 92 et Vancouver en septembre 92.

Je suggère que pour les années qui viennent nous acceptions cette invitation et participions une fois par an à un Conseil de l'ACSA et que réciproquement nous invitons le Président à assister à un de nos Conseils une fois par an également en vue d'évaluer l'évolution de notre collaboration et de promouvoir les échanges entre nos membres.

### B. NAAB (National Architectural Accrediting Board).

La réunion de Vancouver en septembre 1992 a permis de lancer les bases du Séminaire AEEA du printemps prochain (cette réunion a été reporté à une date ultérieure). Il sera organisé par le Conseil de l'AEEA et le Secrétariat permanent et il aura lieu à Bruxelles. ## I - EUROPEAN ACTIVITIES

### 1. 24th EAAE WORKSHOP EINDHOVEN

Organized by the Faculty of Building and Architecture, Technische Universiteit Eindhoven 22-26 April 1992.

The workshop has been commented on and reported by Luigi Falco, A. Swinnen and S. Chardonnet in News Sheet n° 30, October 1992. In the name of the General Assembly, I want to convey to the organizers our thanks for the wonderful job they have done. Something I have already done in the name of the Council.

### 2. 2nd EAAE COMPETITION EINDHOVEN

Organized by the Faculty of Building and Architecture, Technische Universiteit Eindhoven.

You will find a summary of the results of the competition in the EAAE News Sheet n°30. A complete report presenting all the projects as well as the ensuing debate is available from Eindhoven or the EAAE permanent secretariat.

### 3. VIVE LA VILLE? VIVRE SA VILLE

At the request of the Cité des Sciences et de l'Industrie de la Villette in Paris and of the person in charge, O. Katian, we announced a call for participation by school of architecture in the preparation of an exhibition on how young architects look at the city today. (Please see further informations in this News Sheet).

#### 4- Administration and management.

We are still functioning on a voluntary basis. Through my University we have some quarded-time secretarial support. And at Arc et Senans, you have the opportunity to meet Nicole Mouzon whose help is precious and allows us to manage the Association more efficiently. However, this is not enough if we want to improve the range and the quality of services to our members.

## II- INTERNATIONAL CONTACTS

### A- Collaboration and exchanges with ACSA

H. Louw and myself met at Delft our American colleagues and explore with them the best ways to improve our collaboration and our exchanges in the near future. One of the topics was the Prague Conference.

As President of the EAAE, I was invited to take the floor at the opening of the annual ACSA European Conference. I presented a paper giving my point of view on ACSA-EAAE COOPERATION.

I tried to highlight those issues which in my opinion, should organize our future exchanges. They are set out in the form of a paper available from the EAAE Secretariat.

I hope you agree that these three issues could serve as a basis for further discussions with our American colleagues.

With the new President Jim Barker and the Executive Director Richard McCommons, H. Louw and myself discussed future common activities.

The presence of Marin Malecha among us in Arc et Senans, is one of the tangible results.

Another is the invitation issued by ACSA to the EAAE President to attend regularly ACSA Board meetings. The first occasions were Montréal (July 92) and Vancouver (September 92). I suggest that in coming years the invitation should be accepted once a year and that we should invite the ACSA President once a year to one of our meetings to assess common problems and the progress of our collaboration and to promote and increase the exchanges among our members.

Montréal was the opportunity to go into further details of the organization of Prague Conference.

**B- NAAB (National Architectural Accrediting Board).** Preparation of the Brussels EAAE-NAAB workshop, 1993.

The Vancouver meeting, September 1992, gave the opportunity to work on the launch of the 26th EAAE Workshop. Scheduled to take place in 1993 in Brussels, it will be organized by the EAAE Council and the permanent secretariat. Members of the NAAB and ACSA Boards, will meet for two days with members of the EAAE Council, which for the occasion will be extended to about 24 individuals to represent the different European regions. The topic: "from School to Professional Practice".

The third day will be open to all EAAE members and representatives of professional organizations.

### C. OTHERS

We should not confine our contacts to the US and Canada. I propose to extend them gradually to other similar associations. Opportunities or better your suggestions could help us to slowly increase our intercontinental contacts. Since last year I was approached by Australian and Mexican members of Architecture Schools Associations.

1. Mexico: travelling for our University to Guadalajara I took the opportunity to ask for a meeting with representatives of the Mexican Association. Preliminary talks at Guadalajara January 1993.

2. Australia: exchange of correspondence.

## THESSALONIKI FORUM

### LES ECHANGES DANS L'ENSEIGNEMENT DE L'ARCHITECTURE

L'Expérience Européenne des Programmes de Coopération Educative en Architecture

Depuis plus d'une décennie les Ecoles d'Architecture européennes ont introduit dans leurs principes éducatifs le développement des échanges des savoirs et des expériences au sein du contexte scientifique et culturel international. De nombreux programmes d'échanges sont réalisés par les écoles pour encourager les étudiants à suivre une partie de leurs études à l'étranger et les enseignants à participer tant aux cours d'autres écoles qu'aux efforts de développement des nouvelles formes de programmes d'éducation architecturale. En même temps, des cours communs sur la théorie et la pratique architecturales ont placé étudiants et enseignants provenant d'écoles et de pays divers, devant les différences et les similitudes par rapport aux façons de penser l'architecture et la ville et aux façons de projeter l'espace architectural et urbain. Toutes ces expériences sont diffusées plutôt sélectivement et ne sont connues que des petits groupes qui les ont produites sans jamais arriver à constituer une connaissance cohérente évaluée et disponible.

L'Association Européenne est fondée sur le principe de la promotion et de la mobilité des idées et des enseignants dans le domaine de l'éducation et de la recherche architecturale. Pour atteindre ces objectifs l'Association a décidé de contribuer à la création d'un réseau d'informations relatives aux activités et aux programmes menés par ses écoles-membres, de promouvoir ainsi l'échange d'étudiants, d'enseignants et d'expériences, et de formuler des propositions concrètes concernant des nouvelles formes de coopération. Afin de rendre ces objectifs opérationnels, le Conseil de l'AEEA a décidé de consacrer le XIII<sup>e</sup> Forum à la question de l'évaluation des expériences acquises récemment dans les programmes d'échanges dans le domaine de l'enseignement de l'architecture. Cet événement aura lieu à Thessalonique du 11 au 14 Novembre 1993 et sera accueilli par l'Ecole d'Architecture de l'Université Aristotélique de Thessalonique.

Le Forum approchera la problématique par deux axes au moins étroitement liés entre eux. Le premier de caractère plutôt théorique aura pour double objectif:

- d'examiner et d'éclairer les raisons et les perspectives des échanges pratiqués entre les différents "environnements" d'enseignements;
- d'actualiser, de redéfinir de nouveaux

buts et objectifs pour les différents types d'échanges entre les écoles d'architecture.

Le second axe aura un caractère plus opérationnel et sera orienté vers la définition et l'élaboration de nouveaux schémas de coopération correspondant aux buts et aux objectifs mentionnés plus haut et tenant compte de:  
a) la dynamique contemporaine de l'enseignement  
b) la spécificité de l'architecture en tant que discipline  
c) l'expérience récente des programmes d'échanges appliqués par des écoles d'architecture d'Europe avec le soutien des différentes institutions.

Le XIII<sup>e</sup> Forum doit donner l'occasion aux membres de l'AEEA qui s'intéressent à cette question de mieux comprendre les pratiques de coopération appliquées par leurs collègues. Pour cette raison, une exposition des travaux, des projets et des textes produits dans le cadre des programmes de coopération entre écoles sera organisée pendant le Forum.

Les propositions de communications (une page avec titre, thèmes abordés et conclusions) et les informations concernant le matériel disponible pour l'exposition, devront parvenir avant le 28 mai 1993 à l'adresse suivante:

## EXCHANGES IN ARCHITECTURAL EDUCATION The European Experience of Educational Cooperation Programs in Architecture

It is more than a decade since Schools of architecture in Europe have begun to incorporate, in their educational principles, the furthering of exchange of knowledge and experience within the international scientific and cultural context. Large number of exchange programs have been set up among institutions encouraging students to follow part of their studies abroad, and staff to participate in lectures in foreign schools as well as in international efforts to develop new forms of architectural educational programs. At the same time, numerous common courses on architectural theory and practice have brought students and teachers from different institutions face to face with the differences or similarities in ways of thinking about architecture, about the city and the ways of designing architectural and urban space. All these experiences are dif-

fused rather selectively and shared mainly between the small groups that have produced them without constituting a more coherent, evaluated and broadly available body of knowledge.

The European Association for Architectural Education, have been founded on the principle to promote the exchange of ideas and persons within the area of architectural education and research. To further these aims, the Association set out to contribute to the creation of an information network about activities and programs applied by its School members, to exchange students, staff and experiences and to make specific proposals towards closer relations and cooperation. To give a more operational perspective to all these aims, the Council of AEEA decided to devote the XIII<sup>e</sup> Forum to a discussion on the question of the evaluation of the exchange experiences in architectural education. This event will take place in Thessaloniki-Greece from November 11 to November 14, 1993 and will be hosted by the School of Architecture of the Aristotle University of Thessaloniki.

The Forum will approach the above question through, at least, two main and closely related axes. The first one will have a theoretical point of view with a twofold objective:

- To examine and clarify the reasons and the perspectives of the existing exchange practices between different architectural education "environments".
- To update, redefine or introduce new aims and targets for the different kinds of exchange between schools of architecture.

The second axis will have a more operational approach and will be oriented towards the definition and the elaboration of new collaborative schemes corresponding to the above reasons and aims and taking into account:

- the contemporary dynamics of architecture in a European context
- the specificity of architecture as a discipline
- the experience of different exchange programs held by European Schools of Architecture and supported by different institutions during the last few years.

Forum XIII must give EAAE members interested on this subject the opportunity to gain a better understanding on the cooperative practices applied by their colleagues. For this reason an exhibition of works, projects, books or any other kind of material produced within the framework of the recent cooperation programs, will take place during the forum.






Façade latérale de l'Eglise du Sacré Coeur (1928-1933)

## Les commencements de l'enseignement de l'architecture


